

Do Not Export a Broken Experiment

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Do not export a broken experiment.

Every age makes things that travel farther than its wisdom.

A ruler may carry a cruel law from one town to another because it made order easy in the first. A merchant may carry a bargain across the sea while leaving the cost behind. A builder may repeat a useful machine until no one remembers how to live without it.

The form changes. The mistake does not.

Something works for the powerful, or works for a while, and is carried onward as if movement had proved its goodness.

It spread, therefore it was right.

It became common, therefore it was necessary.

It became difficult to leave, therefore it must continue.

None of these are proofs.

A thing can be useful and still be dangerous. It can bring order to one place and ruin to another. It can become harder to question as more lives are built around it.

Before a powerful thing is carried into a new place, five questions should be asked.

Can it be seen clearly?

Can those who live with it speak against it?

Can it be stopped or set apart?

Can the damage it causes be found and repaired?

Can a people refuse it, or leave it, without being punished for leaving?

These are not questions against invention.

They are questions against carelessness dressed as destiny.

If they cannot be answered, the thing should not travel yet. It may need to remain small. It may need to be repaired. It may need to end.

Good things can travel.

They arrive without demanding worship. They can be understood by the people who must live beside them. They leave room for refusal. They do not turn help into ownership or exchange into capture.

The danger begins when a gift becomes a condition of belonging.

A road can become a border. A record can become a cage. A remedy can become a command. A helper can become a master. What was brought to serve a place can begin to remake the place only for itself.

Then the question is no longer whether it can travel.

The question is whether it has learned how to arrive without taking the world away from those already there.

This rule reaches beyond any one city, kingdom or century.

If people one day cross greater distances, they will not leave their old duties behind. A far horizon does not make a broken thing clean. A new world is not a permission slip for old harm.

What can move is not therefore ready to move.

What can be built is not therefore ready to be carried onward.

Responsibility must travel before power does.
